
# How to do Sashiko (刺し子)

#### How to handle Sashiko threads

 Sashiko threads are twisted loosely. Do not loosen them and use them as they are.



1. Cut all the threads.

 Wrap the threads in a paper to keep them tidy.
Pull one thread at a time from the loop.

## About the pre-printed fabric


- The lines printed on the cloth are prints that will fade with repeated washing.
- To erase the lines sticking out, rub them gently with a wet cotton swab.
- Because the fabric is the natural fibers (cotton), some knobs might be found on.

## How to handle the finished product

- Use a neutral detergent with a dry-cleaning mark, and wash gently in room temperature water.
- To prevent the color of the thread from fading, do not soak it in water.
- After washing, dehydrate and dry it quickly.

#### How to deal with seams

 Fold the pre-printed fabric in half. Sew 1 cm outside of the outline, leaving the edge open for turning.
Cut around the outline leaving 1 cm all around it.
Turn inside out, and sew the edge.





#### How to stitch

• If you stitch with 2 threads, pass a thread( $\alpha$ )through the eye of the needle and stitch with 2 threads( $\alpha \& \beta$ ).



- Stitch along the pre-printed line.
- Start stitching the outline, and then the pattern inside.
- Stitch over the starting and ending three stitches as indicated in the picture below, and cut the ends of thread close to fabric.






 Pull the fabric taut as you stitch, so that the fabric does not pucker.

# Tips for stitching

 Be sure to run the needle through the corner, to keep the corners sharp.



 On the intersection, avoid crossing over and leave centre open.



 When you cross empty space, pass threads on the back of the fabric, and continue to stitch.
